Internet safety is taught to all classes at the beginning of the autumn term every year as part of the computing program and then reinforced at intervals throughout the year.

It is now a statutory requirement for primary schools to deliver Relationships Education and the Department of Education (DfE) encourages schools to deliver Sex Education that ensures both boys and girls are prepared for the changes adolescence brings and – drawing on knowledge of the human life cycle set out in the National Curriculum for science – how a baby is conceived and born. In teaching this the class teacher may make an assessment based on the individual requirements of the class to separate year groups for teaching purposes. In the event of this both year groups will receive age appropriate teaching in separate sessions that may have differing outcomes.
