

Emperor Claudius

First Roman emperor to successfully invade Britain.



Julius Caesar

Famous Roman leader who attempted to invade Britain.



Septimus Severus

First African Roman Emperor. Responsible for strengthening Hadrian's wall



Boudicca

Celtic queen who led the Iceni tribe and fought back against the Romans.



Romulus & Remus

Mythical twin brothers who founded Rome.



Paulinus

Ruler of Roman Britain who defeated Boudicca

Vocabulary

- Amphitheatre** A large open air theatre where Romans would go to be entertained.
- Caledonia** The name used for Scotland during the Roman times.
- Celts** People living in Britain at the start of the Roman invasion.
- Centurion** A Roman army leader who was in charge of 100 soldiers.
- Citizen** A person who is part of the Roman empire.
- Conquer** To take over a piece of land or country by force.
- Emperor** A person who is in charge of a country or empire.
- Empire** A group of countries that are ruled by one person or country.
- Invade** Attack to try and take land.
- Latin** The language that the Romans spoke.
- Mosaic** One picture made up of thousands of small tiles.
- Rebellion** Fighting against a government or somebody that is in power.

55 BCE
Julius Caesar attempts first invasion of Britain.

27 BCE
Alexander the Great dies not long after defeating Persians

43 CE
Roman invasion of Britain

50 CE
London is founded

60 CE
Boudicca rebels against Roman forces

80 CE
The Colosseum is built in Rome.

122 CE
Hadrian's Wall is built between Scotland and England.

312 CE
Christianity becomes the official religion of the Roman Empire.

410 CE
The last Romans leave Britain.
